


Roddy Macaulay, who has died aged 94, was, for many years, a much respected and loved local GP in Broadstairs. He joined his father in the family practice in Broadstairs in 1964 after completing his studies at Lincoln College Oxford. For many years afterwards Roddy organised an annual get-together of the Rugby team from the college. He has been a Wanderer since 1945 as the club resumed full operations after the second world war and played as a wing three-quarter until injury curtailed his playing career. This was a blessing in disguise for Wanderers because he then channelled his energies into administration. Roddy clearly enjoyed organising and attending a good night out and among his souvenirs are many tickets to Thanet Wanderers' Annual Balls which he attended with his beloved wife Jane. Initially club treasurer for twentyfive years, he then became club secretary for another

twenty-five before taking a short break and then becoming President for five years until 2008. He was made a life member in 1969 and was the longest serving member of the club. Not the least of his achievements was to become the father of triplets, Liz, Henry and Peter, who continues to play for Wanderers and rumour has it he may be making an appearance in this afternoon's match. Bridge was another abiding passion for Roddy who continued to play remotely until shortly before his death. Roddy was, until recently, a regular at Wanderers matches where he kept a keen eye on today's players from the clubhouse balcony and heaven forbid that anyone should miss a tackle! The time he gave to the Wanderers is quite remarkable and for his family, an example of how to live a thoroughly good life!

RIP Roddy, you will be missed.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

There's a very warm welcome today for those representatives of the National Health Service who are able to join us for today's lunch which is a token of the club's and the Paul Keohane's Trust's thanks to them for their care on every day of the year and particularly for their magnificent life-saving efforts during the pandemic. We welcome too, the officials, players and supporters of Charlton Park RFC, who today have Doug Hursey, the President of Kent RFU, who is also the CEO of Charlton Park, amongst their numbers. We are delighted that you can join us today Doug and we look forward to hearing your promised few words.

There are not too many of us around nowadays who remember life before the NHS was created on the 5th of July 1948. Prior to that date, there was a very limited service for a limited number of workers but not for their families. Many families were registered with a GP and paid to be on his panel but many of the neediest were excluded because of the cost and the doctor expected to be paid when he called to see a sick patient. In my own family, my parents' first and third children both died in their first year during the early 1930s and my mother, who herself had been a nurse in the 1920s, would point out that the treatment they required would have been routine in the UK, had they been born a generation or two later when we had the NHS and the research that has taken place since its creation. The fear that sickness caused by such diseases as Poliomyelitis, Diphtheria and TB current, was a very real one for parents at that time. The creation of a health service, that was funded by taxation, but was free at the point of service, was a magnificent achievement for the driving force behind it, Aneurin Bevan, the Labour Health Secretary. He resigned from office when his government imposed prescription charges in 1951 for dentures and spectacles. Today's heirs to the early pioneers of the health service continue to provide care that is second to none in the world. We are proud to welcome you as our guests today, thank you for joining us for lunch.

The Charlton Park Rugby Club was founded in1893 and played as Old Charltonians until1920. Like so many clubs, their early history was an itinerant one. Wanderers had begun their rugby journey seven years earlier but the histories of the two clubs run similar paths, turning out multiple teams up until the second

world war. The Park's pavilion was destroyed by a bomb and with housing desperately needed, prefabs were built on the ground. After the war, the south Londoners had a thin time up to the 1970s when new players appeared. Park's climb up the newly formed leagues in the 80s and 90s was a steady one and culminated with promotion to National Division 4 South in 1996 where their stay was short as professionalism began within our game. Wanderers' trip to Twickenham, to win the inaugural Intermediate cup, was in 1997 and twenty years later Park made the same journey but finished runners-up to West Leeds after a close game. Park lost to Wanderers in the 1998/99 season, in London One, when sides played each other just once and went on to be relegated whilst Thanet finished in 3rd place. Wanderers survived for another six years in that league before being relegated from a league that then contained the likes of London Scottish and Richmond. Our paths have crossed regularly in the seasons since and some good contests have been seen. Last year we both won away with Park being our successful visitors on the day of the Colin Brown memorial day.

What does today's match hold? Thanet's progress this season has been hampered by an unprecedented spate of injuries and we are now in tenth place in the twelve-team league. Young players have stepped up and will have gained valuable experience for the seasons ahead. Charlton Park are just two positions higher and both sides will be aiming to move up the table today.

I understand that this will be back-row forward, James Hamilton's, last game for Wanderers before he returns to his native New Zealand. James is a quality and very likeable player who was the first XV's player of the season last year: his services have been invaluable to the club. Thank you, James.

Today's match will be preceded by a minute's silence when we will remember Dr Roddy Macaulay who died last week at the age of 94. You will be missed on the balcony today Roddy as you have been over recent months. You leave a big gap within our club. A separate notice appears elsewhere in this programme.

## FROM THE HEAD COACH

We welcome Charlton Park to St.Peters today for our latest league game. In recent seasons these have always been tight affairs with just a couple of points separating us either way. Honours were even last year with both teams winning the away fixture. Our job was made harder at Kidbrooke when Louis was inexplicably sent off 15 minutes into the game. The red card was later rescinded but the damage was done. Fortunately we just about scraped the win with 14 men digging in for 65 minutes. Today we hope to keep 15 players on the pitch for the whole 80 minutes to get that elusive second victory of the season. Looking at Charlton Parks results this season: they seem to be having the same extremes of performance as ourselves. This is probably due to availability and trying to create a settled team that is proving difficult to all teams in this league, with the exception of Cranbrook, who remain the only unbeaten team in the league after 7 rounds of matches and despite having only fulfilled 6 of them, they sit top of the table. Interestingly 3 of the 4 promoted teams occupy 3 of the top 5 places in the league. Our next 3 games after today are against the teams all around us at the bottom of the table. Wins here will lift us back out the bottom third securing mid table safety by Christmas and with our two games in hand we could still achieve a good finish come the end of the season. We have adjusted our pre-season aim of a top three finish, due to the stuttering start to the season following a glut of injuries to key players. Hopefully our luck will return and results will start to improve.

At the same point last season we had had a similar slow start to the campaign, again winning only 1 of our first 5 matches and later just 2 of our opening 8 fixtures. Maybe we are just slow starters here at Thanet, as we got moving from then on, only losing 5 of the next 14 matches. Rest assured the lads will be working hard to get things on track both at training and on match day.


Today we will be remembering a true Wanderers legend with a minutes silence before kickoff. Dr Roddy Macaulay was already a club icon when I joined Thanet Wanderers in 1983. His very vocal support from the touchline back in the 80's, when I started my first team playing days and latterly from the balcony, was unforgettable. He's encouragement to those on the pitch to "tackle, tackle, tackle" which was replaced later with "corner flag, corner flag" and his most recent shouts of "get into him", always let you know that Roddy was watching and cheering you on. He was a great servant of the club, holding most of the top officers jobs at some point. He will be greatly missed by all those who knew him. We are fortunate to have his son Peter playing in the first team today to help us remember Roddy and celebrate his life.

We bid a fond farewell to James Hamilton as he plays his final game for us today. James casually rocked up one Tuesday night last summer, when Covid restrictions were being lifted and the club was gradually getting back into pre-season training for 2021/22. His kiwi accent should have been the giveaway. Not wanting to over impress from day one he gradually showed over the next few weeks what a quality player he was. He received more man of the match awards than anyone else through that season, missing only one game to watch his beloved All Blacks team play Wales in the autumn internationals. He was rightly named Player of the Season at the club supper in April. He certainly will be missed by the whole squad, coaches and supporters alike, not just for his contribution on the pitch but socially as well. We wish you a safe trip home and a long and successful rugby playing career.

#### Thanet Wanderers 10 - 34 Bromley RFC

Wanderers' faltering start to the season continues with defeat to Bromley.

Prior to the match three debutants, Tyler Cawood, Lewis Downer and Mike Whitehead were presented with their match shirts by Club Chairman Chris Panteli. It was good to see Kieran Wright back in a Thanet first XV shirt but the dismal news on the fitness front again limited the selection pool. This was exacerbated in the warm up when Sam Rolfe, who expected to return to first team duties at full back, pulled up. Marius Thompson moved to full back and Downer started in a re-jigged back line. Harrison Leach was called up from Deal, where he was playing for the 2s, to complete Wanderers 1st XV squad.

Playing up the slope, with the wind, Wanderers dominated the opening minutes but conceded a penalty and Bromley cleared that early danger and established themselves in Wanderers half. The visitors' pack used a series of pick and goes to open the scoring and minutes later converted a penalty to open up a 10 point lead. Thompson's long clearance showed the strength of the wind as it was gathered by the gusting wind and bounced over the dead ball line meaning a restart on Thanet's ten metre line. Louis Marshall, on Wanderers left wing was tackling strongly and forcing his way over the gain line but the visitors' defence was sound. The referee was knocked over conjuring up visions of the abandoned match at Heathfield for Wanderers but thankfully James Goksaran was able to continue and complete a good match. Nick Herbert reduced the deficit to 10-3 with a penalty when a Bromley hand was active in the ruck but two minutes later a converted try put the visitors 17-3 ahead. With half time approaching, a Bromley penalty set them around twenty metres out and a try followed wide left to give them a 22-3 lead at the interval.

Just four minutes after the restart, Bromley took advantage of some soft Thanet tackling to register their bonus point try and lead by 27-3. Tyler Cawood had made his debut in the second row earlier but now the genial giant was forced off with a hand injury which could sideline him for some time. He has recently returned to the Thanet area after army service which included being on the bench for the Army and Navy game. Inside centre, Cam Pond, became the next to withdraw after being knocked out and around the hour mark Bromley crossed for a fifth try. Five minutes later some quality handling amongst Thanet's backs tacked from right to left before Tom Walton, who was playing in the centre, ghosted through, in his inimitable way, to touch down under the posts for Thompson to convert and make the score 34-10 to the visitors. Thanet worked hard to reduce the deficit but will be disappointed that they could not find another score against a Bromley side who had had their own share of injuries and whose seniors in the scrum were clearly struggling. Credit goes to determined defences that there was no further score and Wanderers had suffered another heavy defeat.

Leach played well after reaching the ground just before half-time and blindside Warren Riddell-Broomfield worked incredibly hard in defence where his example was inspirational. Skipper Nick Herbert also led by example with fine tackles but today's man of the match was Kieran Wright who switched from the second row to the back row and had a great game in both positions. Work commitments may limit his availability but it was good to see him back.

#### East Kent Viragoes U 16s girls v Aylesford Bulls/Sevenoaks U16s girls

On Sunday the 9th October, Thanet U16's Girls joined forces with girls from Deal and Dover as the Viragos, to take on a team made up of girls from Aylesford Bulls and Sevenoaks. As separate girls' teams last year, both Aylesford Bulls and Sevenoaks proved overwhelmingly powerful and as a combined outfit this season they will be an unenviable force to come up against.

The Viragoes were one player short for the first ten minutes of the game due to prevailing traffic conditions in the area, but despite this the team resisted several strong attacks from the combined Sevenoaks Bulls. However, it wasn't long before the power and speed of the opposition got the better of the Viragos and they were over for their first try. After a second try against the Viragos the East Kent girls composed themselves while under the posts and hit back hard from the kick off. After recovering the ball they maintained possession as they forced their way up the field, off loading out of tackles, they rucked hard and fast and eventually passed the ball wide to the full back who powered over the try line to score. This was a great demonstration of all round rugby play. Unfortunately, the kick for the two extra points was unsuccessful as the ball struck the posts.

Having been buoyed up by this great piece of play, the girls unfortunately switched off momentarily at the restart and the Sevenoaks Bulls ran in a further try almost immediately.

At half time the score was four tries to one in favour of Sevenoaks Bulls, but nevertheless it had been a very competitive first half, with some very impressive rugby from both teams.

The second half wasn't so easy for the Viragoes. Their lack of substitute players inevitably meant that the girls on the field had to work very hard all match against a team able to interchange players from a squad of twenty plus girls. Despite some valiant attempts by the Viragoes to maintain possession, ruck and counter ruck, the Sevenoaks Bulls were able to use their speed, power and fitness on a huge first team pitch to ship the ball wide and run in some impressive tries, six in all.

Although the final tally was 55 points to 5 in favour of Sevenoaks Bulls, the match had seemed a great deal closer than the score indicated and I'm sure the girls will look forward to narrowing the score line to get a closer result at any future meetings between the two sides. **Steve Powell**

### THANET WANDERERS SEND

# **PROGRAMME**

What we have achieved so far.

Thanet Wanderers started our first ever SEND hub in July this year for an initial 7-week programme for term 6 and the uptake was incredible with the rugby club having 20 plus students at each session with a range of ages from 5 up to 20. We have had students with autism, partially sighted and ADHD.

We were fortunate to have received an initial grant for the project from Sport England and we collaborated with Kent Rugby, Wooden Spoon and Inclusive Sport, all of whom were actively engaged in the project, and this helped massively.

We split the groups of attendees into under 11s and over 11s where we did a combination of different games and skill-based activities, and we tried to get students feedback on what they enjoyed and let them have an input in the choices and decisions as to what was included in the sessions

After the success of the 7-week programme we arranged some bonus sessions in the school holidays as we could see as a club, the need for and importance of the programme and how much parents and students had enjoyed the original sessions.

We had already decided to restart the programme for next year (2023) for a longer period and agreed we would do a whole term so term 5 and term 6. As we didn't want to wait that long, we also worked out a 9-week programme to run from the 28th of September through to the 30th of November for this year.

We supply free food every week when the students are given pizza, chips, and chicken nuggets and as you can imagine this goes down incredibly well and is a firm favourite.

With the monies from a previous grant we were able to give out prizes to all attendees every week and the type of prizes we have given out include

- Trophies
- Medals
- Rugby balls
- Hats
- · T-shirts specifically made for the programme
- Colouring books and colouring pens
- · Sweets and chocolates

We are still in our first year since starting something that is completely new to the club and pretty much unheard of in Kent rugby. We are very fortunate as a club to have lots of amazing volunteers who have helped massively with getting this programme off the ground and helping coach each session. We pay for a coach from Inclusive Sport to help with the programme which is an expense to the club but also gives us more help with the coaching.

Parents feedback has been amazing and so positive, and you can feel and sense the need for SEND programmes in the area and there is a huge demand but sadly not enough out there for students to access. The fact that Thanet Wanderers are able to offer this service free of charge with no expense to parents or carers is great credit to the club and a huge achievement.

#### Beccehamian RFC 69 - 3 Thanet Wanderers RUFC

Wanderers slip to their heaviest defeat of the season so far in West Wickham.

Beccehamian were supported by a good sized sporting crowd who had enjoyed a splendid President's Lunch and whose numbers was bolstered by three fine gentlemen from the Chelsea Pensioners.

Wanderers team was further depleted when Neil Wakefield and Cameron Pond, from the original selection, were declared unfit. Tom Walton played at full back with Harrison Leach at scrum half.

It was clear from the kick off that Beccehamian were ready for an open game of rugby. Despite a couple of early successes for Wanderers at set scrums, good handling took the hosts over after three minutes for a converted try and a converted penalty minutes later opened a 10-0 lead. Good work from Wanderer's pack led to a converted penalty from Wanderers' ten, Marius Thompson but Beccehamian responded with a penalty and an unconverted try to lead 18-3 after half an hour. Thompson withdrew with a recurrence of a shoulder injury: Ollie Greene-Taylor joined a reshuffled back line. Kurt Pearson replaced Mike Whitehead in the front row. Two more tries, with one converted, followed for the hosts with some quality off-loads and passing to open a 30-3 lead and gain a try bonus point. Two penalties for Thanet gave them good field position but a forward pass with the line close meant no change to the score as the first half ended.

Noah Dann came on in the back- row replacing Lennie Brown for the second half. Beccehamian went further ahead with a converted try three minutes in. Walton's fine kick took Thanet to 30 metres out but the home defence was sound. Warren Riddell-Broomfield made a try saving tackle that epitomised his unflagging commitment. Whitehead returned as

Danny Clement withdrew with a dead leg. An excellent long pass resulted in Beccehamians sixth try and the seventh followed five minutes later to make the score 49-3. Clement returned replacing Pearson who was sidelined with a hand injury. A penalty raised the hosts half century before Dann was shown yellow for a high tackle and a further try made the score 57-3. Skipper Nick Herbert was adjudged to have made a high tackle which took Wanderers down to thirteen men as the game moved in to the final ten minutes. Winger Andrew Dolan ran well but was brought down just short of the line and Beccehamian added a further try before showing admirable commitment to protect their line as Wanderers pressed in the closing minutes. Walton became the latest injury worry for Thanet as he limped off with an ankle injury before the hosts added to Wanderers' misery with a tenth try to make the final

Gully Goodall travelled to fill the tighthead berth for Thanet and had an outstanding game which made him this week's man of the match. There were too few bright spots for Head Coach Mike Pond who acknowledged the excellent performance of Beccehamian who well deserved their win.

Next Saturday Charlton Park are the visitors to St Peters. Kent RFU President, Doug Hursey, who is also the Park's CEO, will attend. The game will be preceded by a lunch to say thank you to fifty Guests from the NHS after their efforts over the years and particularly during the pandemic. 
