Sidcup 2nd XV are positioned 2nd in the League with Thanet Wanderers right behind them in 3rd, equal on 14pts, with Sidcup's' massive points difference giving them the advantage, so today's game could be a tight one.

Despite being at opposite ends of the County the two Clubs share some similarities.

Sidcup Football Club (as it was known) started in 1882, but it was not until 1884-85 that a full fixture list was played. Thanet Wanderers was founded one year later in 1886 and both Clubs currently field 3 Senior sides.

We look forward to a good, flowing, injury free game this afternoon, a game that reflects the competitive nature of the sport and upholds the true values of the game. I would also like to welcome today's Match Official Alan Whittingham, who I believe may be making his first visit to St Peter's Rec. He has a difficult job with new laws evolving and the habits of players who have played for years having to adjust, sometimes against their subconscious to change and adapt to a new playing style.

We thank you for your time and without you, 30 referees and 1 player wouldn't get a game, or have I got that the wrong way round?



MATCH REPORT

THANET WANDERERS RUFC 37 – 12 MAIDSTONE RFC

Six sparkling tries from Wanderers as they shine in the sun.

Ben Cannon, Sam Taylor and Adam Harrison, who had all made good starts for the Wanderers in their opening two fixtures, were unavailable for this game. Lenny Brown stepped into the loosehead berth, and Brett Scott was a starter at number eight. Callum Doody moved from scrum half to take the ten shirt and there was a debut in senior rugby for Tom O'Callaghan. at nine. Maidstone had won one of their opening two fixtures, and Wanderers aimed to extend their unbeaten start.

Maidstone kicked off up the slope but Wanderers were soon on the attack and when the visitors infringed after five minutes, Lewis Downer slotted the penalty for an early 3-0 lead to the hosts. Doody's penalty found a long touch to take Thanet well inside the opposition's 22. Thanet's backs combined well and took the Wanderers close. O'Callaghan drew some of the defenders as he went right before Wanderers' hooker, Finn White showed great awareness and speed to ghost down the blindside of a ruck for a try that was not converted but Thanet led 8-0. Both sides will rue the number of penalties they conceded that halted promising situations for them. The visitors missed a very kickable penalty whilst for Wanderers Scott and Jake Whittlesea combined well before Maidstone lost ground when called back for taking the ball back in. Back surged Wanderers and established themselves in the visitors' 22. Two penalties in quick succession kept Thanet close to the line and a big effort saw the pack cross and Mike Whitehead emerge as the scorer. Downer converted for a 15-0 lead to the Wanderers. Minutes later Wanderers were penalised for being in front of the kicker and found themselves back on the defence. A nicely executed catch and drive from the visitors' pack brought them a touch down for an unconverted try, The 15-5 scoreline remained a few minutes later when the half-time whistle sounded.

Whitehead took a break with Dominick Springer replacing him for the start of the second half. Maidstone pushed to take advantage of the slope but Wanderers defence stood firm. Another penalty attempt for the visitors slid wide and it was clear Thanet had moved up a gear. Louis Marshall had been a bundle of energy on the touchline waiting for some action and he replaced Jake Whittlesea early in the second half. Around the hour mark, strong Thanet pressure brought a penalty for Wanderers and a yellow card for Maidstone's Number seven Reggie Lampey. Marshall now combined with skipper Warren Riddell-Bloomfield and open-side James Crompton down the right and at the subsequent breakdown, Lenny Brown completed the trio of scorers from Wanderers' front row today. Downer's conversion attempt rebounded from an upright and Wanderers' were ahead 20-5. More top handling followed four minutes later after Andy Letts strode through defenders down the left. Doody's long pass set Marshall free and he then extracted himself from the breakdown to pick up and scorch over, low to the ground. Downer's conversion attempt went across the face but the try bonus point was secured. Five minutes later a fifth try followed a lung bursting build up. A misplaced clearance was gathered by Mirams who evaded a couple of chasers before chipping ahead when the ball was moved across the field from Dennis Davies to Crompton and Brown and on to Downer who finished strongly. No conversion but at 30-5, the selectors gave their captain a break giving ten minutes to Finley Hickmott who had time to remind them of his talent whilst Brown also signed off after a good shift with Whitehead back. Maidstone had no intention of going quietly and, playing some good rugby, they were alert to a loose ball and scored a well-converted try. To Wanderers went the final word. Mirams again broke from deep, Marshall received at the breakdown near Wanderers' ten-metre line and was near the

opposition line when challenged. Downer's chip kept the move alive and Marshall doubled around to pass to White who handed on to Downer to touch down and then convert his own try for a 37-12 final score.

Head Coach, Elliot Blackmore is quietly satisfied with his team's performance and praised the debut of Tom O'Callaghan who will now go to University in Cardiff after an excellent first game in senior rugby. A player who is at the other end of the experience scale is back-row forward Brett Scott. Playing at number eight today he showed that he is fully recovered from the injury sustained in a pre-season fixture and displayed all his many skills and will to win today to be chosen as the Thanet Coaches' Man of the Match.

MATCH REPORT

ASHFORD LADIES V THANET LADIES

Thanet Ladies second game of the season started with a kick-off from their flyhalf Alex White which landed beautifully in Ashford's twenty two. Emily Williams, returning to the side after a head injury, picked up from a ruck following a strong chase from the ladies and this led to a turn-over with Ashford now on the back foot. Hollie O'Collaghan played her role well, drawing in the defenders to give a quick off-load to Rachel Austerberry who was then able to do what she does best; break through the defensive line, pass several players on route and score a try in the corner.

History tells us that an early try for Thanet Ladies usually leads to a win for them. Ashford, having played Thanet twice the previous season, must have been aware of this and ramped up their defence; a forward-heavy game-play meaning Thanet struggled to make any breaks, but Lia Armstrong and Katerina Stuart held their ground on the wings, seeking and creating opportunities that enabled Chloe Sidd to score a try which was converted by Wanderers kicking pro Alex White.

Knock-ons from both sides saw the first half dominated by scrums, but the forwards, led by Holly Thurman-Newell and Georgia Elks, held their own. Both of these players put in strong-carries, which is typical of their play. Neave Evans and Brioni Reah, debuting as flankers, put in ankle-grabbing tackles and strong

ruck-support, making it difficult for Ashford's backs. However, an opportunity presented itself that saw Ashford ladies make a break, narrowly avoiding Thanet's full-back's attempt to cover and a try resulted making the score 12-5. Following a defensive scrum in Ashford's 5 yard area, skipper Gee Cordell put pressure on Ashford's number 8, which led to Thanet gaining possession and White was able to score her first try of the season.

The physicality of the game continued to put pressure on both teams, but an ambitious chip and kick from Chloe Sidd led to a two on one battle on the try line, with Chloe coming out on top and scoring her second try. With another conversion from White, (naturally) the final score was 24-5 to Thanet Ladies. We thank Ashford for their sportsmanship and hospitality, and look forward to their hosting of our re-match next week for the first round of the Papa Johns Cup on the 29th September. Last year saw Wanderers place 8th in this national competition, but this season we're setting our sights a little higher.

Our Mission

What They Do

- 1. Talks for Change: Barry and Margaret Mizen travel to schools, youth groups, prisons, churches, and workplaces, sharing Jimmy's story to engage with young people and adults. These powerful talks focus on issues such as the consequences of anger, the impact of violence, and the importance of forgiveness and personal responsibility. By using Jimmy's life as an example, they inspire others to reflect on their actions and make positive choices.
- 2. Walking for Jimmy: This annual fundraising event was started in 2013 on what would have been Jimmy's 21st birthday. The walk covers 24 miles across 21 of London's bridges, symbolising the journey of resilience and unity. It has grown each year, bringing together people from all walks of life to celebrate Jimmy's legacy and raise funds for the foundation's work in promoting peace and community engagement.

- 3. Rugby for Change: As a tribute to Jimmy's love for rugby, this program uses sport as a platform to engage young people and teach them valuable life skills. Through the values of teamwork, discipline, and respect that rugby fosters, participants learn about leadership, personal responsibility, and the importance of making positive choices.
- 4. The Sparkle Award: The Mizen Foundation recognises young people who exhibit qualities that Jimmy himself demonstrated, such as kindness, compassion, and a willingness to help others. This award, presented in schools, celebrates those who make a positive impact in their communities, encouraging more young people to follow in Jimmy's footsteps.

MATCH REPORT

WANSTEAD COLTS 14 – 19 THANET WANDERERS COLTS

Thanet Wanderers Colts faced a long journey to North London for their clash with Wanstead, marking the first time I believe, any Thanet team had visited the club. Wanstead offered a warm welcome, showcasing very impressive facilities and a lush, rain-soaked pitch; perfect conditions for a gritty rugby contest.

The game unfolded over four tightly contested quarters. The first two quarters saw both teams battling hard, with nothing to separate them. Despite solid play, neither side could find the breakthrough and the half-time score remained 0-0. Both teams making minor errors but also defending resolutely, keeping the game finely balanced.

In the second half, Wanstead came out with renewed purpose. A missed tackle from Thanet opened the door for Wanstead's talented fly-half to score the first converted try, giving them a 7-0 lead. Moments later, another lapse in Thanet's defense allowed Wanstead to exploit space inside, doubling their advantage with a second converted try to make it 14-0. Thanet's heads had dropped, and it seemed like Wanstead might run away with the game.

However, the game turned dramatically on a key moment. Jem stripping the ball from Wanstead's winger after an attack in Thanet's half. Turing into space, he stepped inside the covering defense and embarked on an exhilarating foot race to the line. Despite a last-ditch tackle attempt from Wanstead's winger, he powered through to score under the posts. The conversion was good, bringing the score to 14-7 and revitalizing Thanet's belief in themselves.

With momentum on their side, Thanet pressed forward. Fin G really growing in his hooker role, delivered a spectacular solo effort, breaking through Wanstead's defensive line with a powerful run to touch down, narrowing the gap to only two points (14-12).

Thanet's scrum had been impressive, with the welcome return of Will Gedge in the scrum

with Finn T and a strong performance from Harrison making a significant difference. A crucial moment came when the Wanderers won a scrum against the head. Solid No. 8 Charlie B picked up from the base and powered over the line for a decisive try, giving Thanet a 19-14 lead following the conversion.

In the closing stages with eight minutes to go, Wanstead pushed hard to try to snatch victory. They had a try controversially disallowed for double movement after having dropped another scoring opportunity on the line previously in the half. Thanet's defense held firm, with outstanding last-ditch tackles preserving their slim advantage. Before Callum hoofed the ball into touch, on the final play of the game.

Despite a tense ending, this was a memorable and hard-fought win for Thanet Wanderers Colts. Showing true grit and determination to turn around a 14-0 deficit.

Special mention goes to the back five of Charlie P, Ellis, Owen, Hubert and Dillon, who's tackling was instrumental in securing the victory. The backs combination of Cai, Oli, Tom, James, Vinnie and Alex (playing out of position but still putting in a good shift on the wing). Good to see Finn W back to increase the number of Finns in the team to the max and to further bolster the squad.

Coaches' man of the Match went to Jem Harris for his try and tenacious last ditch try saving tackling.

A LOOK BACK AT LAST SEASON

The mighty Thanet Wanderers Veterans won the Spitfire Gold County Shield on Sunday at Maidstone RFC, completing an impressive 33-7 win against Tunbridge Wells.

The Wanderers' first try came from the evergreen Stuart Plumridge who was on hand to crash over. Paul Moat also showed his strength bursting through to score on the left-hand side after slick passing. Not long after, a rampaging run from Chris Gregory, straight through the heart of the Tunbridge Wells defence, set up an attack. After the ensuing ruck, deft hands, particularly from Simon 'Engelbert' Harris, put Elliot Stokes into space down the right wing. Thanet's very own Flying Pig used all his years of experience to make the righthand corner for a cracking try. Chris Gregory powered over after close-quarter drives from the Forwards, who provided a great platform for the backs to attack from. Chris Williamson, James Whowell and Andy Bourton all had their hands full in the front row and showed their grit under pressure. In particular, Chris Dengate's steadying presence solidified the scrum, which, like most of the shirts and waistbands on the pitch, looked under significant pressure. Chris Marson and Paul Dickinson's relentless tackling and turnovers provided repeated opportunities to turn defence into attack, with Tom Longdon's

probing kicks repeatedly putting the opponents on the back foot.

Tunbridge Wells were held up no less than four times over the Thanet try-line through outstanding teamwork and the Thanet Veterans' physicality. This took its toll on the opponents' morale, and Kev Etheridge and Tom Harvey repeatedly carried strongly into overtiring Wells' bodies.

Perhaps the game's best try came from Man of the Match, Tim Williams, who broke down the right-hand side from in his 22 and after outpacing all but one of the defenders, he passed inside before deft hands carried the ball to Jonty Stevens who scored under the posts.

William Wallace deservedly lifted the Spitfire Gold Shield to great applause. Peter Macaulay, the duty manager for the old folks day out said: "It was a harder win than the score suggests and I'm very proud of their commitment and how they came together to make another great Wanderers day!"




